



Berry Mansion 700 Louisville Road, 502-564-3000

Berry Mansion is listed on the National Register for Historic Places. Built by distillery executive George Franklin Berry and his wife Mary in 1900, this Colonial Revival mansion sits on a bluff overlooking the New State Capitol and the Capital City. A Gothic Revival music room (added in 1912) features hand carved oak woodwork and houses an immense cathedral organ. Other features include stained glass windows and original decorative sconces featuring the Juniper tree. Hours: Mon. - Fri. 8:30am - 4pm.

Lawrenceburg, KY 40342, 502-839-3436 One trip to our historic distillery and you'll begin to understand why our Bourbon has come to be so mellow. Nestled in the quiet Kentucky countryside near Lawrenceburg, and on the banks of the scenic Salt River, the Four Roses Distillery makes the trip to this very mellow place all that more rewarding. The Distillery was built in 1910 and features a unique Spanish Mission-Style architecture rarely seen in Kentucky. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and operates continuously, except for the summer months, typically July through mid-September. Distillery tours are available year-round, Monday-Saturday, every hour between 9AM-3PM. Tour last about 45 minutes and are free of charge. There are no tours on Thanksgiving Day, December 24, 25, 31 and January 1. Please call our Visitor's Center at 502-839-3436 x 18 prior to your visit for more information.

Frank Lloyd Wright-Ziegler House

509 Shelby Street

Frank Lloyd Wright, recognized as the greatest American architect, designed his only house built in Kentucky for the Rev. Jesse R. Zeigler. The 1910 "prairie style" house has a lighted stained glass case surrounding the fireplace at the ceiling, the only one designed by Wright during this prairie period. Listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Home is not open to personal tours.

Historic Frankfort

Two night stay

Day 1

Begin your journey with a guided tour of the KY State Capitol. See the house and senate chambers, as well as the beautiful interior of this 100 year old building. If you happen to be in town on a Tuesday or Thursday, be sure to schedule a tour of the Governor's Mansion. If not, take the time to stroll the grounds of the Capitol. You'll see the floral clock, the rose garden and the new sculpture garden, and you can walk by the Governor's mansion and see the beautiful flower beds.

Head to downtown Frankfort for lunch along Broadway St., then stroll 1 block to the T.D. Clark Center for Ky History. Enjoy the self-guided KY Journey, which takes you through the history of KY from pre-settlement to modern times. Admission here allows you to tour the Old Capitol Building - which you can do on Day 2.

Across the street from the Center for Ky History, find the Capital City Museum. In here you can explore over 200 years of politics, architecture, misbehavior and

Day 2

Start your second day in Frankfort with a guided tour of the Old Capitol Building. Remember, you admission to the History center, buys you entrance here. Finish here and walk across the street for a great cup of coffee and a snack at the Kentucky Coffeetree Café.

Three blocks away you'll find Liberty Hall Historic Site. This home of KY's first senator is a fascinating journey back in time.

After lunch, spend the afternoon doing the downtown walking / driving tour. Pick up a guide at the Visitor Center.

Day 3

Before leaving Frankfort, you'll want to stop at Daniel Boone's Grave. On your way out of town, make one last stop at the Vietnam Memorial - this unique site is a beautiful tribute to the service men of that era.

Convention Center is just a short drive to major population centers and airports in both cities and Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky. Grand Theatre

Greenhill Cemetery

East Main Street

Offers a stone monument with the names of 142 African - American men from Franklin County who served in the United States Colored regiments during the Civil War. It was erected in 1924 by what was believed to be a women's affiliate of an African -American post of the Grand Army of the Republic, a Union Army veterans' organization. The cemetery contains Kentucky's only monument to black Civil War soldiers. Hours: Dawn to dusk.

This one-of-a-kind collection includes an impressive display of artillery, firearms, edged weapons, flags, uniforms, and personal equipment reflecting Kentucky's military heritage. One of the most unusual and original memorials in the country, it overlooks the city and contains the names of Kentuckians killed in Vietnam engraved in granite below the memorial Sundial, where on the anniversary of each soldier's death, the point of the gnomon's shadow actually touches the veteran's name. Located in the heart of Kentucky's Bluegrass Region, Lakeside Arena is in close proximity to major interstates, motels and restaurants, while maintaining a picturesque, rural atmosphere on 77 acres of rolling hills, lakes and bluegrass horse country. The site offers 60 camper hookups and showers. This multipurpose facility is specifically designed for the horse and livestock industries, but allows for agribusiness-related trade shows, educational programs, sales and exhibits in an all weather atmosphere.





Liberty Hall Historic Site 202 Wilkinson Street, 502-227-2560, 888-516-5101, libertyhall.org

The site consists of two historic homes. Liberty Hall (1796), the Georgian-style mansion of Kentucky's first senator, John Brown and the Greek-Revival Orlando Brown House (1835), a residence designed by Kentucky's most famous architect, Gideon Shyrock. These architectural masterpieces from Kentucky's early decades are decorated with antiques owned by four generations of Brown's that lived in the houses. Family portraits, famous Paul Sawyer watercolors and American Empire furniture abound! The grounds contain a formal boxwood garden with nearly three acres of beautiful, perennial and annual borders. Hours: March - Dec., Tue. - Sat. 10:30am, 12pm, 1:30pm and 3pm. Cost \$1 youth (5-18), \$4 adults, \$3 seniors, \$3 AAA members. Ad on page 14

Mayo – Underwood School Historical Monument Mero Street in front of the Capital Plaza Tower

Erected in 1928 and dedicated September 3, 1929, Mayo - Underwood High School replaced the 1884 Clinton Street High School. The only public funded school for African - Americans in grades one through twelve was under the auspices of the Frankfort Board of Education. The school's name honored two African - Americans. Professor and Principal William H. Mayo and Dr. Edward Ellsworth Underwood, a physician. June 1957 marks the last graduating class and 1965 identifies the closing as the result of mandated integration for public schools in Frankfort and Franklin County. May 23rd 1998, this site was dedicated as the African - American Historical Public Education Site in Frankfort, Kentucky.

The popular Murder and Mayhem Tours start from the Capital City Museum at 7:30pm every Thu. night during the Month of October. This eerie trek through darkened alleys and streets led by two early 1900s costumed Frankfort policemen presents over 30 grisly downtown murders. The tales are true and due to their graphic and explicit content persons

under 18 are not allowed. Cost is \$7.50. Advance reservations are required.

Old Bridgeport School Antique Mall and Café

The Old Bridgeport School was built in 1941 and is nestled in the historic community of Bridgeport. The old school has been converted to a 20,000 sq ft antique and collectibles. Home to 33 Kentucky governors from 1798 to 1914. Landmark mansion is listed on the national Register for Historic Places and notable for the seven U.S. Presidents who have visited there. Hours: Mon., Tue., and Thu. 1:30pm - 3:30pm.

Old State Capitol

Broadway and St. Clair Streets, 502-564-1792, history.ky.gov

Operated by the Kentucky Historical Society, this national landmark introduced Greek Revival architecture to the United States west of the Appalachian Mountains. Former home to Kentucky's House and Senate, this building features a unique self-supporting staircase held together by pressure and precision. Site of the shooting of William Goebel, the only governor in American history to die in office from an assassin's wounds. Reservations requested for large groups. Hours: Tue. - Sat. 10am - 4pm. Combined with the Thomas D. Clark Center for Kentucky History and the Kentucky Military History Museum cost is: \$4 for adults, \$3 veterans, \$2 vouths (6-18), free to children 5 and under. \$2 students, teachers and chaperones for groups of 10 or more. Kentuckians are proud to call Ruth Hanly Booe (1891-1972) the "Mother Of Bourbon Balls." It all began when Ruth Hanly (Booe) and her friend Rebecca Gooch, both in their mid 20's, started their business one year before women received the right to vote in public elections.
